Jacks Split Friday Doubleheader, Rest Through the Weekend

The East Texas Pump Jacks shut out the Victoria Generals in the second leg of their doubleheader on Friday night to secure the series split.

The Pump Jacks had a weekend date scheduled with the Woodlands Strykers, but the three-game set was nixed due to the aftermath of Tropical Storm Bill.

Caskey pitched 5.1 innings in the finale, and struck out six while allowing just four hits.

On the other side of the coin, the Pump Jacks offense gave Caskey an early lead to work with, scoring runs in the second and third innings.

Tristan Clarke led off the bottom of the second with a walk and stole his way to third base to set the table for Nick Roark. With two outs, Roark laced a first-pitch single to center field to drive in his first RBI of the summer.

Brandon Grudzielanek led off the third with a single, moved to second base when Joey Libby was hit by a pitch, and took third on a passed ball with Clarke at the plate. Generals' catcher Dakota Phillips let another pitch squirt by, and Grudzielanek broke for the plate. Phillips lunged to place the tag on the Jacks' baserunner, but Grudzielanek evaded the tag for the Pump Jacks' second run.

Meanwhile, Caskey was working his

way through the Generals lineup.

A single, a walk, and a hit batter loaded the bases for Caskey with two outs in the fourth, but he again escaped the jam when he coaxed an easy grounder to Dylan Mecham at third base.

The Generals came close to getting on the board in the fifth when Grudzielanek couldn't handle a potential double-play ball that could have ended the inning. Caskey struck out the next hitter but then had to face Phillips, the Generals' home run leader, with two outs and the bases jammed.

Phillips blasted a 1-0 fastball to deep right field, and just as it was about to strike the right field wall, Clarke made a running grab. What could have been a bases-clearing double to give the Generals the lead was instead an inning-ending fly out thanks to Clarke's range.

Caskey earned the right to start the sixth, but he gave up a single to the leadoff hitter, and a mental lapse in the outfield allowed the batter to reach second. Caskey put the next batter down on strikes, and with that head coach Ernie May called on Tyler Adams to preserve the 2-0 lead.

Adams struck out the next two batters to end the inning, and recorded his third punchout in a row when he

opened the seventh inning. He issued a seven-pitch walk to the next batter, but erased the mistake when he forced Caden Williams into a 4-6-3 double play to end the ballgame.

After drawing three walks in his debut on Sunday, Grudzielanek led the offense in the nightcap as he collected his first two hits as a Pump Jack to go 2-for-2 with a walk and a run scored.

Bryce Howe got the start in the opener and persevered through six innings despite allowing six earned runs. Howe looked to have found a rhythm through the first two innings, but hit a rough patch in the top of the third when he allowed five runs to cross the plate.

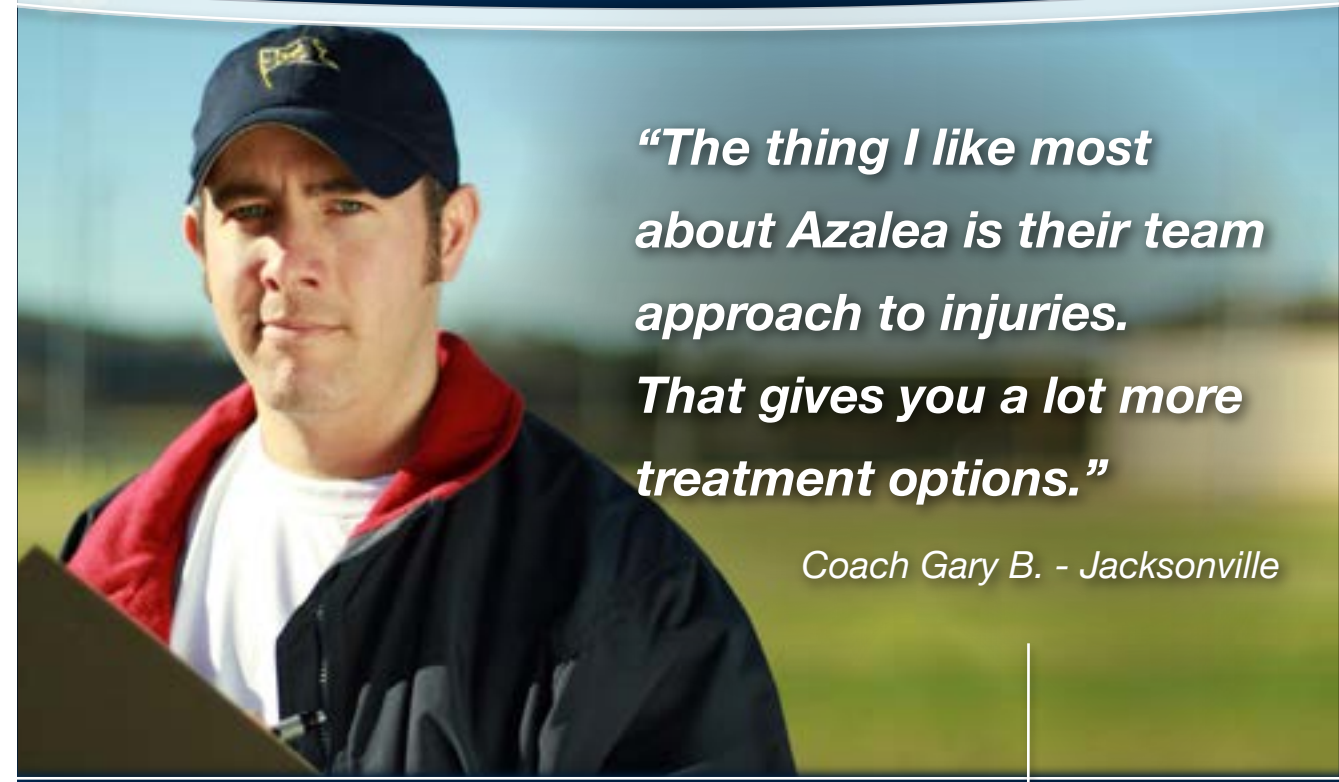

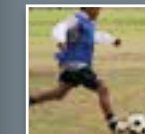
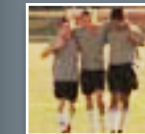

AROUND THE TCL

The Victoria Generals swept the Brazos Valley Bombers in a doubleheader over the weekend to move to .500 on the season. The Generals won the opener 2-1 on a walk-off single off the bat of Matt Smith, and struck again in the last frame of the finale when Bryce Brandl delivered a walk-off single of his own.

Victoria will look to continue its winning ways in The Woodlands on Tuesday and Wednesday, while Brazos Valley welcomes the Texas Marshals for a two-game set.

The Acadiana Cane Cutters and the Marshals split their Sunday doubleheader after Texas came out on top 5-4 in Saturday night's

contest.

Texas starting pitcher Seth Jordan went the distance in the opener, allowing one run on six hits with four strikeouts. The Marshals offense scored two early runs in the first inning, and they cruised to a 5-1 victory.

Acadiana stopped the two-game skid with a 4-3 victory in the night cap. Alex Tucker broke a 3-3 tie in the top of the ninth inning with an RBI single, but the Marshals couldn't answer in the home half despite moving the tying run into scoring position.

The Strykers had three games scheduled over the weekend with the Jacks, but all three were rained out.

Rangers 2, White Sox 3

The Texas Rangers fell to the Chicago White Sox 3-2 on Sunday night on a walk-off home run by Gordon Beckham in the 11th inning. The Rangers scored both runs on solo shots from Ryan Rua and Leonys Martin.

Texas has now lost three of its last four games, and has fallen to three games back of the Houston Astros for first place in the A.L. West. The Rangers will kick off a three-game series at home with the Oakland Athletics on Tuesday night.

The Houston Astros lost 4-3 to the Los Angeles Angels on Monday night. Jose Altuve hit a two-out double in the top of the eighth inning to knot the ballgame at 3-3, but the Angels responded in the bottom half of the frame with a bases-loaded sacrifice bunt from Daniel Robertson.

Huston Street pitched a perfect ninth inning for the Angels to preserve the win. The Astros and Angels will play game two of the series on Tuesday night, as Houston looks to improve on its 18-17 road record.

MATHIAS LEADS SEVEN FORMER JACKS IN DRAFT

Ho hum. Another draft, another bevy of former East Texas Pump Jacks selected by major league teams.

Major League Baseball's First-Year Player Draft wrapped up Wednesday with a total of seven Jacks alumni selected by big league organizations. Leading the way was infielder Mark Mathias, chosen by the Cleveland Indians in the third round, and Joey Armstrong, picked by the Arizona Diamondbacks in the tenth round.

Also hearing their name called were Tyler Sullivan and Jake Kelzer with back-to-back picks in the 14th round, Cameron Gann in the 27th round, Brooks Marlow in the 29th round, and Nate Esposito in the 33rd round.

This marks the fourth straight year the Pump Jacks had at least two former players taken in the top ten rounds. Last year, Jacob Lindgren, Corey Ray, and Mitch Meyer were all drafted in the first seven rounds. Lindgren has already shot through the New York Yankees system and made his major league debut several weeks ago.

The Pump Jacks have now had 57 players drafted by big league organizations, tops in the TCL since they joined the league in 2008.

Mathias is the third former Pump Jack to be drafted in the top three rounds, following Lindgren and Hunter Dozier. Lindgren was the top pick by the Yankees last year in the second round, and Dozier set the TCL record for highest draft choice when he was selected eighth overall by the Kansas City Royals in 2013.

The Indians picked Mathias following his junior year at Cal Poly San Luis Obispo. He was named the Big West Player of the Year and an All-American after batting .386 in 2014, which earned him a spot on Team USA during the summer. He underwent shoulder surgery prior to this spring but missed only seven games, hitting .356 this season.

A member of the Pump Jacks in 2013 after his freshman year, Mathias batted .278 with 20 RBI and eight stolen bases in East Texas.

A teammate of Mathias with the Jacks in 2013, Armstrong was chosen by the Diamondbacks after his junior year with Nevada-Las Vegas. A .277 hitter with UNLV this year, Armstrong has the athleticism to play nearly anywhere on the diamond. He was a third baseman as a freshman, but he

saw time behind the plate in East Texas as the Rebels expected him to play catcher as a sophomore. Instead, he made the jump to the outfield, becoming the team's primary center fielder.

The All-TCL third baseman in 2013, Armstrong batted .299 for the Jacks and led the TCL with four triples. He also finished among the top-10 in the league in hits (52) and RBI (31).

Sullivan and Kelzer not only were selected with consecutive picks in the 14th round, but both of them were chosen by Chicago teams. Sullivan was picked by the Chicago White Sox after completing his col-

legiate career at the University of the Pacific. An all-conference selection as a senior, Sullivan led the Tigers this spring with a .351 average.

Sullivan was a member of the Pump Jacks championship squad in 2012, batting .317 and playing a spectacular center field.

Kelzer went with the next pick to the Chicago Cubs, the second time in as many years the Indiana pitcher has been drafted. Last June, the Yankees chose Kelzer in the 22nd round, but he opted to return to the Hoosiers. The 6-foot-8 righty moved into the Indiana rotation this spring, making 11 starts in his 17 appearances. He went 4-5 with a 3.95 ERA and 57 strikeouts for the Hoosiers.

Kelzer arrived in East Texas in 2013 coming off his freshman year at Indiana. An All-American swimmer in high school, he was still acclimating himself to baseball, registering 18 strikeouts in 15 innings pitched over the summer.

Gann was picked by Arizona with the first pick of the 27th round after completing his college career at Stephen F. Austin

State University. He went 4-3 with a 2.87 ERA, leading the Lumberjacks staff in innings (87.2) and strikeouts (72). After four years at SFA, Gann finished second on the school's all-time list in wins and third in strikeouts.

A teammate of Sullivan's on the 2012 championship team, Gann was fourth on the team with 17 appearances, including six starts. He finished the season 4-2 with a 4.03 ERA, then posted a 1.80 ERA in one start during the playoffs.

A native of Giddings, Texas, less than two hours away from Houston, Marlow was chosen by the Astros in the 29th round.

Marlow completed his senior season at the University of Texas by batting .268 and ranking third on the team with four home runs and fourth with 54 hits. A four-year starter in Austin, Marlow ranks among the school's all-time leaders in starts (third, 217), assists (second, 668), and double plays turned (third, 144).

Marlow had an auspicious opening to his college career, becoming the first Longhorn to hit two home runs in his collegiate debut. He went on to earn a spot on the Big 12 All-Freshman team in 2012. As a junior, he picked up a Division I Rawlings Gold Glove after committing just three errors in 67 games.

Marlow was a fan favorite when he spent the first half of the 2013 season in East Texas. Playing alongside his brother and fellow all-star Ty, Brooks was leading the league with a .375 average when he headed back to campus after the Pump Jacks hosted the 2013 TCL All-Star Game.

Wrapping up the Pump Jacks draft haul was Esposito, who like Kelzer has been through the process before. The Oakland A's selected the California native in 2011 after he completed high school, but Esposito opted to play college ball instead. This time around, he was chosen by the defending American League-champion Royals.

An All-NAIA West pick at Concordia University in Portland, Ore., Esposito hit .338 for the Cavaliers and led the team with 73 hits, 22 doubles, and 32 RBI. He had transferred after three years at Oregon State, including a trip to the 2013 College World Series.

Esposito joined the Pump Jacks in 2013 after that trip to Omaha, batting .253 in 24 games while offering a commanding presence behind the plate.

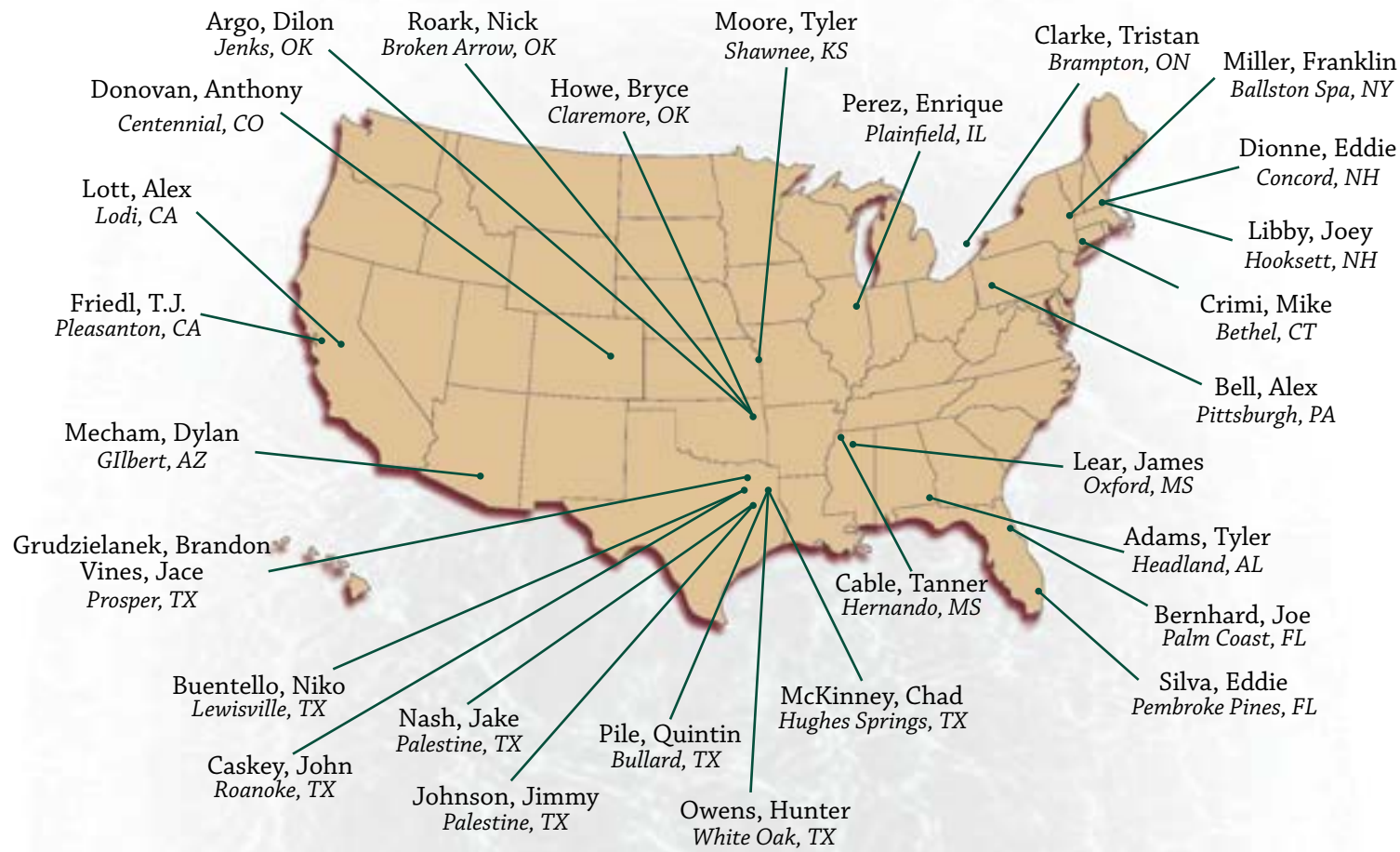

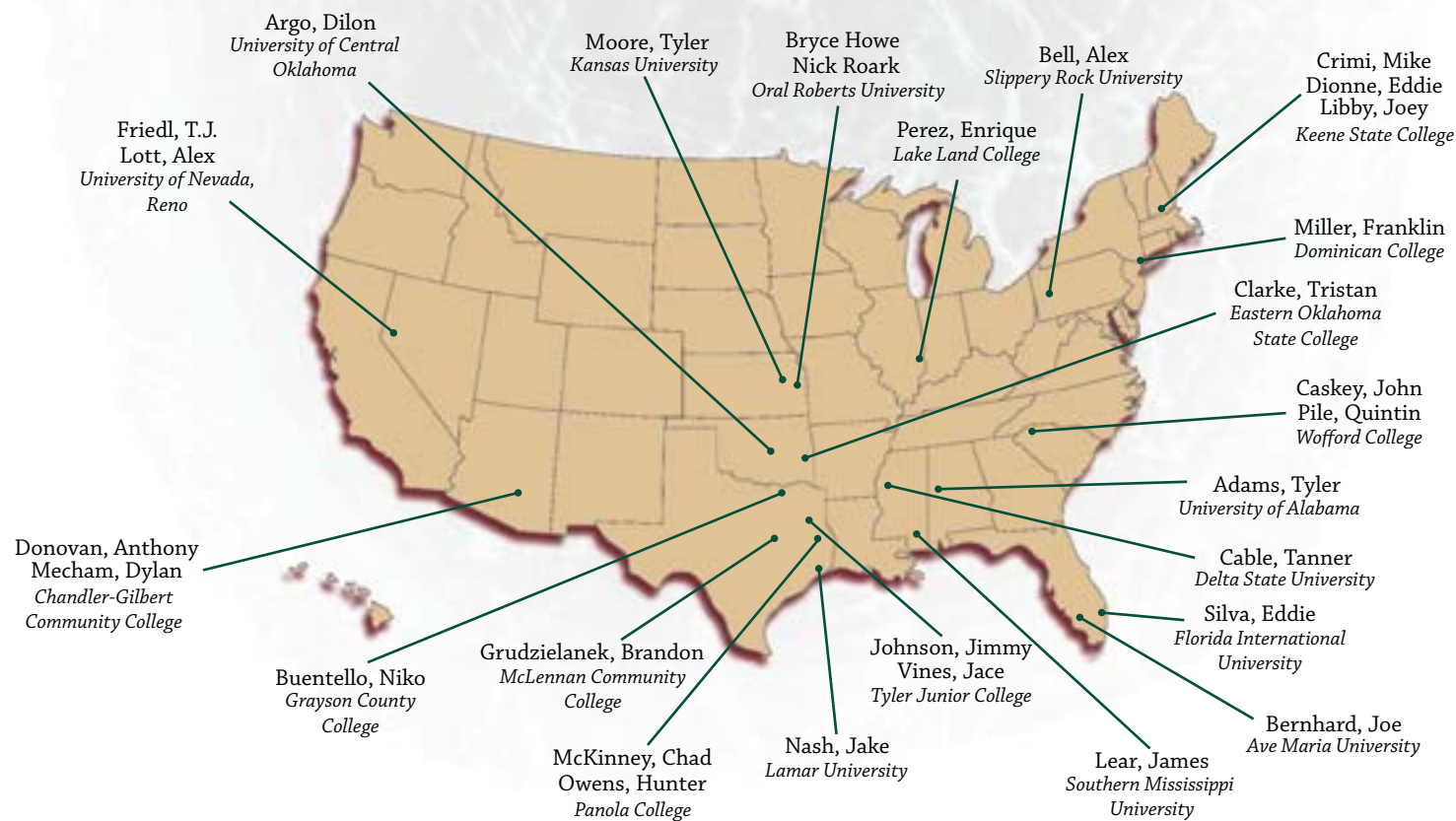

From Kilgore to Tyler

Cable and Lear are Poised to Represent

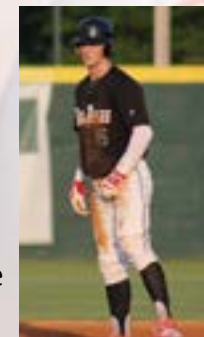
The East Texas Pump Jacks are primed and ready to make a big impression on the city of Tyler, but it is clear that Kilgore still holds a special place in the hearts of returning Jacks Tanner Cable and James Lear. For the past seven seasons, Kilgore fans have made a habit of filling historic Driller Park to its brim, and every year their eyes are drawn to a different player in burgundy and forest green. It was only fitting that Cable and Lear, teammates at Northwest Mississippi Community College in 2013 and 2014, assumed that role last summer.

Cable started the season as a trusted arm in the bullpen, and emerged as a reputable starter during the second half. He quickly showed why the Toronto Blue Jays called his name in the 26th round of the 2013 draft, strutting his 6-foot-5 frame and power arm

as he held opponents to a modest .179 batting average. When August rolled around and East Texas was making a final playoff push, Cable went 2-0 with a 1.41 ERA in his final three starts. Perhaps it was the bond he built with the town of Kilgore that sparked his late-season surge. "I really liked Kilgore," Cable said. "This is a really nice ballpark here in Tyler, too, don't get me wrong, but Kilgore is the first place I ever played in Texas, so I guess it's just a little bit more special." After a spring season at Delta State University in Mississippi where he pitched in just five appearances, Cable is ready to show the Tyler fan base the same fire that fans in Kilgore became accustomed to.

Similar to Cable, Lear also made his mark following the All-Star break. His start to the season was less than prosperous, but his villainous speed

proved to be too valuable to leave out of the lineup. The faith of the coaching staff paid off as he hit .341 over his last 22 games and earned All-TCL honors by summer's end. He sprinted his way to 32 stolen bases and scored 34 runs, which ranked second and third in the TCL. Sometimes the summer season can be a roller coaster, and that's some-



thing that players, coaches, and fans have to bear. Lear appreciated the dedication of the fans in Kilgore, and expects a similar experience in Tyler. "Kilgore was nice," Lear said. "They have a really good fan base and they really took care of us, and we couldn't be happier with our experience there. We're looking forward to our new home here in Tyler and hopefully we can put a good show on for the fans." Time will tell which Pump Jack becomes a household name this summer, but with Cable and Lear entering their final seasons of summer collegiate baseball, you can bet that they're ready to build atop their already solid reputations in East Texas.

May comes to East Texas from Northland College, where he is in his second season as the program's head coach. Last year, May guided the LumberJacks to a 22-17 record overall and tied the school record for wins in a campaign. He helped run the Mets' Class-A affiliate in Pittsfield, Mass., in 1990, where he served under future big league general manager Steve Phillips. He was a member of the scouting and minor league operations department for the Braves in 1992.

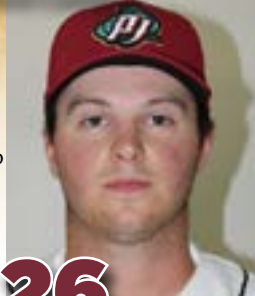

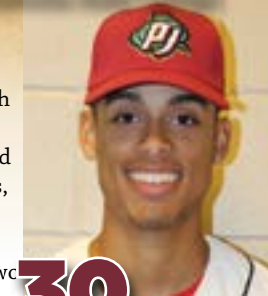

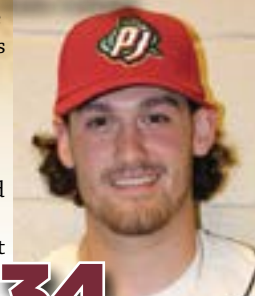
