

Jacks Make Quick Work of Acadiana, Win 1-0 on Buentello's RBI Single in the Eighth

Tuesday evening's battle between the East Texas Pump Jacks and Acadiana Cane Cutters was so fast that if you blinked, you missed it.

The pitching performances turned in by both sides, the defensive gems, and several timely hits all came and went in the blink of an eye.

The result was a 1-0 Pump Jacks win in a game that barely lasted two hours, but never lacked for drama.

The only run of the night came off the bat of Niko Buentello, whose twoout single in the eighth inning brought home T.J. Friedl. Friedl reached when his one-out grounder bounced over the head of third baseman Taylor Braley. Braley was playing shallow at third to take away the bunt from Friedl, then watched helplessly as the ball bounced over his head.

Braley quickly redeemed himself, charging in on Brandon Grudzielanek's sacrifice bunt. It took a barehanded scoop and throw to nab Grudzielanek, but Friedl moved into scoring position for Buentello. The Pump Jacks first baseman lined a clutch single to center that scored Friedl for the winning margin.

East Texas held the Cane Cutters at bay with the combined efforts of pitchers Jace Vines, Enrique Perez, and

Tyler Adams. Together the trio allowed just five hits and two walks while striking out five.

Vines got the start, his first as a Pump Jack, and went the first three innings. The All-American hurler and NJCAA Division III Pitcher of the Year allowed two hits and struck out three. He also showed his cool on the mound, striking out Conner Short with runners on second and third to end his outing.

Vines was closely watched by scouts from TCU, Oklahoma State, and Arkansas, and Texas A&M head coach Rob Childress even made the trip personally. The highly-touted freshman has been heavily courted since leading Tyler Junior College to a national championship this spring.

Vines gave way to Perez, who continued his dominant spring with five shutout innings. The freshman right-hander gave up just three hits and walked one while striking out two. He is now fifth in the TCL with a team-leading 1.13 ERA.

Perez got a little help from center fielder Dilon Argo in the sixth inning. Short led off by reaching base on a Grudzielanek error, then moved to second on a sacrifice. On a single to center, Short rounded third and headed for home, but Argo charged the ball and threw a direct strike to catcher Tyler Moore, who easily made the tag.

After the Pump Jacks took the lead in the eighth, it was time for Adams to pick up his fourth save of the season.

Acadiana earned a one-out walk and inserted speedy pinch-runner Braedon Barret. But Moore took care of Barret, gunning him down at second on a stolen base attempt before Adams coaxed a popup to end the game.

Friedl and Buentello each picked up two hits to lead the Jacks offense, and Grudzielanek had a hit and a walk. In three games with East Texas, the nephew of former major leaguer Mark Grudzielanek has five walks and three hits in ten plate appearances for a whopping .800 on-base percentage.


Infielder Eddie Silva had a 1-for-3 night, and picked up his first hit as a Pump Jack.

Victoria scored two runs in the second, third, and fourth innings and took a commanding 6-3 lead into the final frame. The Strykers had runners on first and second with two outs in the ninth before a balk advanced them into scoring position.

Athletics 8, Rangers 6

The Texas Rangers dropped their third game in a row to the Oakland Athletics on Tuesday night by a score of 8-6. The Rangers owned a 5-2 lead after the fifth inning before Oakland scored four runs in the sixth, and added two more in the seventh to extend the lead.

Texas has now lost four of their last five games, and has fallen to four games back of the Houston Astros for first place in the A.L. West. Meanwhile, the Los Angeles Angels have moved to within a game and a half back of the Rangers for second place in the division.

Astros 13, Angels 3

The Houston Astros bounced back from their tough-luck Monday loss with a 13-3 shellacking of the L.A. Angels on Tuesday.

Chris McHugh pitched eight strong innings, allowing two earned runs on nine hits while striking out six. Angels' starter C.J. Wilson only lasted into the fourth inning, and was pulled after surrendering seven earned runs on eight hits.

Houston's offensive outburst was powered by rookie Carlos Correa and Luis Valbuena. Correa hammered a three-run homer in the third inning to give the Astros a 4-0 lead, and Valbuena smashed a solo shot in the fourth followed by a two-run bomb in the next inning.

Mike Montgomery starred as the Seattle Mariners blanked the Kansas City Royals on Tuesday night, pitching a complete-game shutout with 10 strikeouts.

Dustin Ackley hit a two-run home run in the fifth inning, and Logan Morrison went deep with the bases empty in the eighth.

MATHIAS LEADS SEVEN FORMER JACKS IN DRAFT

of former East Texas Pump Jacks selected by major league teams.

Major League Baseball's First-Year Player Draft wrapped up Wednesday with a total of seven Jacks alumni selected by big league organizations. Leading the way was infielder Mark Mathias, chosen by the Cleveland Indians in the third round, and Joey Armstrong, picked by the Arizona Diamondbacks in the tenth round.

Also hearing their name called were Tyler Sullivan and Jake Kelzer with backto-back picks in the 14th round, Cameron Gann in the 27th round, Brooks Marlow in the 29th round, and Nate Esposito in the 33rd round.

This marks the fourth straight year the Pump Jacks had at least two former players taken in the top ten rounds. Last year, Jacob Lindgren, Corey Ray, and Mitch Meyer were all drafted in the first seven rounds. Lindgren has already shot through the New York Yankees system and made his major league debut several weeks ago.

The Pump Jacks have now had 57 players drafted by big league organizations, tops in the TCL since they joined the league in 2008.

Pump Jack to be drafted in the top three rounds, following Lindgren and Hunter Dozier. Lindgren was the top pick by the Yankees last year in the second round, and Dozier set the TCL record for highest draft .351 average. choice when he was selected eighth overall by the Kansas City Royals in 2013.

The Indians picked Mathias following his junior year at Cal Poly San Luis Obispo. He was named the Big West Player of the Year and an All-American after batting .386 in 2014, which earned him a spot on Team USA during the summer. He underwent shoulder surgery prior to this spring but missed only seven games, hitting .356 this season.

A member of the Pump Jacks in 2013 after his freshman year, Mathias batted .278 with 20 RBI and eight stolen bases in East Texas.

A teammate of Mathias with the Jacks in 2013, Armstrong was chosen by the Diamondbacks after his junior year with Nevada-Las Vegas. A .277 hitter with UNLV this year, Armstrong has the athleticism to play nearly anywhere on the diamond. He was a third baseman as a freshman, but he

the Rebels expected him to play catcher as a sophomore. Instead, he made the jump to the outfield, becoming the team's primary center fielder.

The All-TCL third baseman in 2013, Armstrong batted .299 for the Jacks and led the TCL with four triples. He also finished among the top-10 in the league in hits (52) and RBI (31).

Sullivan and Kelzer not only were selected with consecutive picks in the 14th start during the playoffs. round, but both of them were chosen by Chicago White Sox after completing his col-

legiate career at the University of the Pacific. An all-conference selection as a senior, Sullivan led the Tigers this spring with a

Sullivan was a member of the Pump Jacks championship squad in 2012, batting .317 and playing a spectacular center field.

Kelzer went with the next pick to the Chicago Cubs, the second time in as many years the Indiana pitcher has been drafted. Last June, the Yankees chose Kelzer in the 22nd round, but he opted to return to the Hoosiers. The 6-foot-8 righty moved into the Indiana rotation this spring, making 11 starts in his 17 appearances. He went 4-5 with a 3.95 ERA and 57 strikeouts for the Hoosiers.

Kelzer arrived in East Texas in 2013 coming off his freshman year at Indiana. An All-American swimmer in high school, he was still acclimating himself to baseball, registering 18 strikeouts in 15 innings pitched over the summer.

Gann was picked by Arizona with the first pick of the 27th round after completing his college career at Stephen F. Austin

Ho hum. Another draft, another bevy saw time behind the plate in East Texas as State University. He went 4-3 with a 2.87 ERA, leading the Lumberjacks staff in innings (87.2) and strikeouts (72). After four years at SFA, Gann finished second on the school's all-time list in wins and third in strikeouts.

> A teammate of Sullivan's on the 2012 championship team, Gann was fourth on the team with 17 appearances, including six starts. He finished the season 4-2 with a 4.03 ERA, then posted a 1.80 ERA in one

A native of Giddings, Texas, less than Chicago teams. Sullivan was picked by the two hours away from Houston, Marlow was chosen by the Astros in the 29th round.

Marlow completed his senior season at the University of Texas by batting .268 and ranking third on the team with four home runs and fourth with 54 hits. A four-year starter in Austin, Marlow ranks among the school's alltime leaders in starts (third, 217), assists (second, 668), and double plays turned (third, 144).

Marlow had an auspicious opening to his college career, becoming the first Longhorn to hit two home runs in his collegiate debut. He went on to earn a spot on the Big 12 All-Freshman team in 2012. As a junior, he picked up a Division I Rawlings Gold Glove after committing just three errors in 67 games.

Marlow was a fan favorite when he spent the first half of the 2013 season in East Texas. Playing alongside his brother and fellow all-star Ty, Brooks was leading the league with a .375 average when he headed back to campus after the Pump Jacks hosted the 2013 TCL All-Star Game.

Wrapping up the Pump Jacks draft haul was Esposito, who like Kelzer has been through the process before. The Oakland A's selected the California native in 2011 after he completed high school, but Esposito opted to play college ball instead. This time around, he was chosen by the defending American League-champion Royals.

An All-NAIA West pick at Concordia University in Portland, Ore., Esposito hit .338 for the Cavaliers and led the team with 73 hits, 22 doubles, and 32 RBI. He had transferred after three years at Oregon State, including a trip to the 2013 College World Series.

Esposito joined the Pump Jacks in 2013 after that trip to Omaha, batting .253 in 24 games while offering a commanding presence behind the plate.



Anthony Donovan and Dylan Mecham are working together to improve this summer.

Summer collegiate league baseball provides student athletes an opportunity to experience a different part of the country with new teammates and coaches, but for Anthony Donovan and Dylan Mecham, familiarity has played a big role in their early-season success.

Donovan and Mecham manned the middle infield for Chandler-Gilbert Community College in Arizona this spring, and both would admit that their spring seasons did not go as hoped. But since joining the East Texas roster in May, they've been some of the Pump Jacks' most consistent contributors on both



sides of the ball.

With Donovan at shortstop and Mecham holding down second base, nothing gets through the infield. The duo has started up the middle in all but three games this season and neither has committed an error.

Their wizardry on either side of the bag often prompts fans at Irwin UT Tyler Ballpark to stand in applause, and it stirs the type of friendly competition that they can
